Car charger on the way for Bridport

Work has started on installation of an electric vehicle charging station outside the Pavilion Information Centre in Main Street.

The project is an initiative of Bridport Innovations, which successfully sought a grant through the Royal Automobile Club of Tasmania's Community Fund.

The grant met about a quarter of the cost of the three-phase facility, with the balance coming from Dorset Council and Bridport Innovations own funds.

Treasurer Len Gillett, who suggested and lobbied for the project over many months expects the station to be ready for use in October.

The station will operate during opening hours at the Pavilion, with a fee of \$10 for charging a vehicle for up to three hours.

Bridport bird safety in focus

Thousands of plastic discs known as 'bird flappers' have been installed on power lines along Bridport Road to help prevent injuries to birds of prey.

The technology installed by TasNetworks helps alert birds including wedge-tailed eagles, grey goshawks and white-bellied sea eagles to power lines. They can be electrocuted or injured if they fly into power lines or perch on power poles near electrical equipment.

The rectangular discs attach to power lines and swivel in the wind and contain glow-in-the-dark crystals, which absorb and emit purple ultraviolet light, making power lines more visible to birds during day and night. Around 21 kilometres of devices have been installed on Bridport Road, at a cost of \$275,000. TasNetworks' environment and sustainability team leader Ed Parker said they have doubled their investment in bird protection in recent years, in aid of the state's iconic birds. "We're investing about \$5 million over five years to install more than 260 kilometres of mitigation devices in high risk areas, to help prevent injuries and electrocutions," he said. "We're making progress. The number of known state-wide incidents has halved in the past couple of years. But there's still plenty of work to do.

"The Bridport area has some spectacular birds like wedge-tailed eagles and white-bellied sea eagles, and we've moved swiftly to protect them with this work." Rural locations in Tasmania's North-East have been identified as a high-risk area for bird strikes, with about 15 known incidents on TasNetworks distribution network over the past decade.

TasNetworks is also targeting Gladstone, St Helens and Mathinna Road as part of the \$5 million roll-out. In 2019-20, there were 18 known threatened bird incidents across the state, which is 25 per cent fewer than 2018-19 (24), and almost half the number in 2017-18 (33). However, historic under-reporting makes it difficult to gauge the exact number of incidents.

North East Tasmanian Field Naturalists Club Inc.

From as early as 1795 with the wreck of the Sydney Cove on Preservation Island, there have been ship wrecks all around the North East. So, because of its ease of access and because it was in an appropriate spot, it was decided to build a lighthouse at Eddystone Point and this 35 metre tower was commissioned in 1889. The North East Field Naturalists were lucky on their outing there to have this story told by Lindsay and Margie Dawe who are Friends of Eddystone Point.

Twenty four people took the opportunity to explore the area despite a drizzly rain that lasted all day. In the quarry on the shore not far from the lighthouse, they saw remnants of the granite that was used to construct the 1600 tonne building. Because of the taper of the tower, each rock was cut separately to fit, with one rock forming the lintel above the door weighing 5 tonne. The light was tended up until 2001; now an automated beacon has replaced the lantern as the tower's light source.

To the aboriginal community Eddystone Point is known as Larapuna; their ancient middens and artifact scatters are now covered in vegetation. In 2006 the Tasmanian Government issued a 40-year lease for the Larapuna lands surrounding the lighthouse, and the community now plays a part in upkeeping the buildings and taking care of the surrounds.

On October 10th Field Nats will travel to Scamander and be guided in a study of two contrasting river catchments. Because of the distance involved, interested attendees should check the website www.netasfieldnats.com.au or phone Lou Brooker 0417 149 244 for details.

The Murphy Cottage

What's in a name?

Most Bridport residents are familiar with Old Pier. However few realise that the correct name for this feature, approved by the Nomenclature Board, is Murphys Beach. It is the name used on contemporary Tasmaps.

The name is appropriate since David Murphy, a resident of both North Scottsdale and Forester, built a holiday cottage opposite this beach in 1915. The cottage, still standing, was one of the first three houses in the western part of Bridport - back in the days when the settlement was concentrated on the eastern side of the Brid River.

Charlie Barnett's house, a few blocks to the south near the Bentley Street Tennis courts, was built in 1913. Charlie Hookway's place can be found at the junction of Charles and Richard Streets. The pier was constructed in 1916.

David and Alice Murphy later retired to Bridport and were involved with many activities in the town. More information about them can be found in Jeff Jennings's book, 'A History of Bridport'. For local nomenclature consult the 'Tasmanian Towns Street Index published by Tasmap. There is a copy at the pavilion. Note: No astrospheres are used with official place names i.e. Murphys Beach.


