

#### North East Tasmanian Field Naturalists Club Inc.

For as long as can be remembered, the area of saltmarsh visible in Trent Water has only been small, but in the last year, there has been positive growth opposite the old resort and out to the little sand island with the area almost doubling in size: a healthy indicator. There is only one colonising plant at the moment — the beaded glasswort - but there is more diversity closer to the shore and as time goes by, and if there are no threats to its development, we could see many different species of plants there.


Tasmania's saltmarshes are under threat from a range of human activity – unchecked pollution, inappropriate development, offroad vehicle usage, and rubbish dumping to name a few. It is such a unique habitat, that in 2013 saltmarsh became protected under the Commonwealth EPBC Act. At that time it was realised how complex and important an ecosystem it is.

The plants which make up the saltmarsh habitat are salt tolerant – they withstand excess salt and regular water-logging. Besides slowing down the run-off of fresh water from the land, saltmarsh protects low lying land and houses from flooding events and sea level rising. It provides habitat for invertebrates like crabs and snails and shelter for small fish, which in turn provide food for birds. Already we have seen an increase in the number of species of birds seen roosting on the little patch of remaining sand close to high tide.

There are often incursions of sea spurge in coastal areas and to that end local volunteers have been trying to control the introduced weed by pulling young seedlings as they appear and before they flower and set seed. If we continue this, the area will remain in its natural state and flourish.


Beaded glasswort, a saltmarsh plant










#### **Bridport Girl Guides**

# The green and gold by Mike Douglas

In sport, Australian competitors traditionally wear green and gold. These colours were adopted from a great national icon - the wattle or acacia.

The national floral emblem is the golden wattle, native in NSW, VIC and SA but also found on parts of our east coast after escaping from gardens into the4 bush.

September 1st is Wattle Day, a national observance begun in 1910 but now largely ignored.

Wattles are extraordinarily widespread and diverse in character. You could plant a different one for each day of the year and still have more than 500 left over.

The bush around Bridport has nine types of wattle ranging from small shrubs to trees such as silver wattle and blackwood. The juniper wattle, a small prickly shrub found in the Wildflower Reserve, is classified as rare in Tasmania.

Another local type, prevalent in the Wildflower Reserve and suitable for even very small gardens, is the sweet-scented wattle. Easily grown from seed, it is a slender plant attaining a height of about one metre and flowering from May to September.

### **Torrington House**


Bridport has enjoyed a variety of industries since it's humble beginnings, including a sea port, agriculture, forestry and fishing trades. However, one of Bridport's most popular periods in time was the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century, when it had become a popular tourist destination for seaside pleasure-seekers. People from across North East Tasmania, and further afield, would visit Bridport to enjoy the many beach and seaside pleasures on offer. In the first decade of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century, it was noted that there were at least three houses of accommodation in Bridport, including "Ivanhoe House", "Torrington House", and Smythe's House.

Completed around 1905, Torrington House is noted as the oldest original house in Bridport. Torrington House was built by Captain Allan Blackmore Smythe, who originated from Torrington, Devon, England. Captain Smythe operated the "Coronella" out of Bridport and Launceston until the completion of the railway from Launceston to Scottsdale in 1890 made sea trade from Bridport less viable. Economic decline in the 1890s meant that Captain Smythe had to find another occupation. In building Torrington House, he was able to capitalise on the growing seaside tourist trade through the provision of accommodation and pleasure activities, such as boating and fishing.



Torrington House was operated as a Boarding House for accommodation and seaside pleasure activities for many years, changing hands from Captain Smythe to Mr Norman Andrews, whose wife offered "a prettily situated tourist house of accommodation with every convenience". Various local newspaper advertisements by Mrs N. Andrews, Proprietress, offered a "commodious and splendidly furnished Boarding House, situated near beach and river". Many other pleasures were offered, including Morning and Afternoon Teas, Cooking (under strict supervision by the proprietress), Hot and Cold Baths, Tennis, Fishing and Boating.

#### **Care around Granite Point**

Eagle-eyed Bridportonians might have noticed new signage when approaching Granite Point. Taswater have updated an old sign that had been there for a very long time. The new sign still advises that recreating in the vicinity of the waste water treatment plant discharge pipe should be avoided for health reasons.

This new pictorial sign was erected at about the same time that the EPA issued a new Environmental Protection Notice to Taswater. This imposes new more site-specific compliance for Bridport waste water and sewerage management. The comprehensive Feb 2021 document of 26 pages includes performance requirements for odour management, effluent quality improvement, and annual publicly available compliance reporting.

Hopefully this will see improvement in the performance of Bridport's WWTP (waste water treatment plant) so that it will no longer be one of three such plants regularly mentioned as poorly compliant in the

Tasmanian Economic Regulator's Report. Importantly, the new EPA notice also requires Taswater to maintain a complaint register. Readers are encouraged to contact Taswater (Ph: 136 992) should you have any concerns at all about water, whether it be colour, odour, or discharges that vary from normally acceptable standards.

#### Bridport cemetery to re-open

The Bridport cemetery is to re-open for general burials for the first time in 29 years.

Water logging of gravesites forced its closure in September 1992 for all but burials where the plot was subject of a long-term reservation. The Director of Works and Infrastructure, Dwaine Griffin, told the Council a Bridport Cemetery Policy seemed to have been prepared in 1992 to close the cemetery for general burials and it would need to be rescinded to allow burials again. He said attempts to locate a new site for a cemetery in the town had begun four years ago, but none were found suitable. "It was then decided to reinvestigate the potential of re-opening the original site and designing and investing in a suitable sub-surface draining system." He reported that a drainage system was implemented two years ago and its effectiveness monitored particularly over wetter months.

Some provisions would be needed in re-opening the graveyard like increasing plot widths from 1.2 to 1.5 metres and allowing only single depth graves. There would be room for about 50 graves in the existing section and the neighbouring area would need similar sub-surface drainage work before it could be considered.

The recommendation to rescind the Bridport Cemetery Policy was agreed unanimously, with council staff being roundly commended for the efforts to reopen the cemetery. Councillor Leonie Stein said it was important that as the second most populous town in the municipality that Bridport had its own cemetery. "It will ease a lot of emotional stress and heartache for families who will be able to have their loved ones nearby."

Councillor Dale Jessup congratulated the team for persevering. "It would have been easy just to leave the cemetery closed, but they've come up with a good result." Mayor Greg Howard also commended the council gang. "It's not every time you get to solve a 30-year problem," he said.


