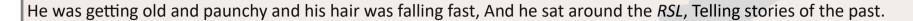

Should you find yourself in danger, With your enemies at hand, Would you really want some cop-out, With his ever-waffling stand?

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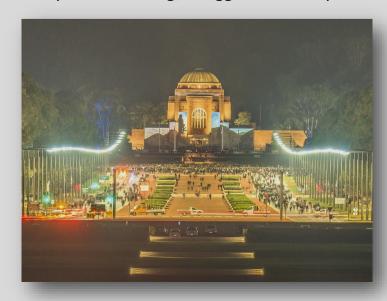
Or would you want a digger; His home, his country, his kin, Just a common Digger, Who would fight until the end?

After playing for 4 years on the 11th fairway, the golf club have now prepared and fenced 3 x 3/4 lawns for our use which are now ready to play on.

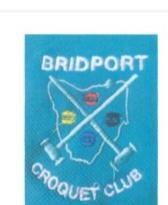

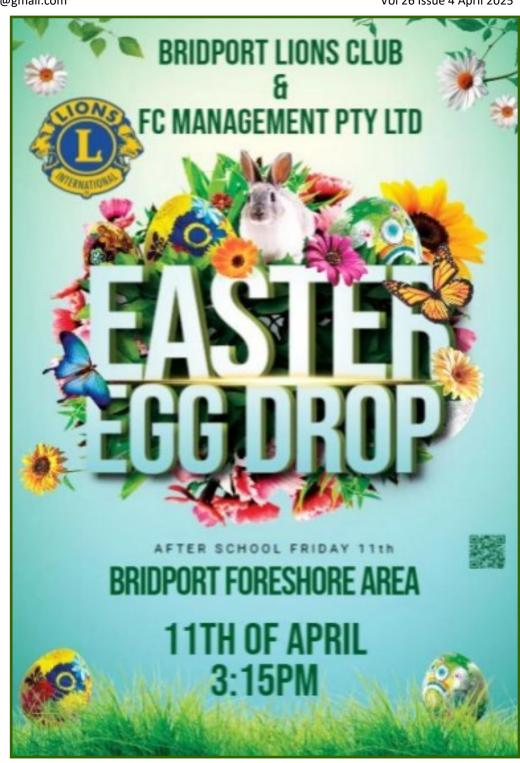

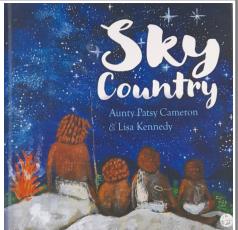

Sky Country by Lou Brooker

Aunty Patsy Cameron's first children's book, Sea Country was certainly very popular in the Visitor's Pavilion in Bridport.
Her next book is now available and has a similar format.

The narrative in Sky Country takes the form of a story told by a Grandmother to children about the Ancestral beings and how they came down from the Milky Way and built the islands, the mountains and the riverways.

Growing up on Flinders Island, our respected aboriginal elder, Aunty Patsy, traces her heritage through her mother's line to the north east clan leader and warrior, Mannalargenna, who is remembered here in the north east on a special day in December each year.

The book is a very successful collaboration between the author and the illustrator Lisa Kennedy, who is also a descendant of Mannalargenna, traced through her father's line. Together, author and illustrator, reveal the wonders of Country. These explanations are done in a very gentle, personal, tender way, resulting in a beautiful text which is both clear and simple, yet evocative.

One of the possible challenges both to aboriginal people and to others reading this book, is the way Aunty Patsy has provided the many place and peoples' names in first people's language. We can only do our best to tackle the names, having made a start with the binomial nomenclature of our favourite local places.

The author begins the book by explaining that there are two ways of knowing, and lately, we are coming to the understanding of how seriously first nations people are connected to Country.

This book can certainly promote great conversations.

Stroke



A stroke occurs when the blood supply to a part of your brain is suddenly reduced. This prevents your brain from getting oxygen and other nutrients from your blood.

Your brain needs a continuous supply of oxygen and nutrients from your blood. Without oxygen or nutrients, your brain cells die and the affected area can suffer permanent damage. A stroke can be fatal. Every day, 23 Australians die from a stroke. Among those who survive, many will have a long-term disability. They are likely to always need help with talking, moving and self-care.

There are two main reasons for reduced blood supply- a blood clot or a bleed. You can remember the main symptoms of stroke by using the word FAST. If you think someone may be having a stroke, check the following:

- Face Has their face or mouth drooped?
- Arms Can they lift both arms?
- Speech Is their speech slurred? Do they understand you?
- Time is critical If you see any of these signs, call triple zero (000).

Immediately and ask for an ambulance. Early treatment could save their life. Other possible signs of stroke include:

- weakness or paralysis elsewhere in the body, on one or both sides
- loss of sensation, usually on one side
- loss of vision or blurred vision in one or both eyes
- a sudden and severe headache
- dizziness, loss of balance or an unexplained fall
- difficulty swallowing
- drowsiness or loss of consciousness.



A stroke is *always* a medical emergency.

The longer it takes to get treatment, the more likely there will be stroke-related brain damage afterwards.

Conditions that can increase your risk of stroke include- high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes and atrial fibrillation (an irregular heartbeat).

Some lifestyle factors can also increase your risk of stroke, including- smoking, unhealthy diet, inactive lifestyle and drinking alcohol.

If you suspect you — or another person — are having a stroke, it is important to get help quickly. Call triple zero (000) immediately and ask for an ambulance.

E-PETITION Tasmanian Parliament

Local resident Diana Wilson is the Principal Petitioner of this E-Petition.

Arthritis and Osteoporosis Tasmania is appealing to the 1 in 4 Tasmanians living with arthritis and related conditions to please take a moment to sign this online petition calling on the Tasmanian Government to deliver its 2023 budget commitment to establish Statewide Musculoskeletal Service, including the development of permanent northern based Rheumatology Service and Persistent Pain Clinics.

The 2023 State Budget allocated \$6 million through the Outpatient Transformation Program for the establishment of these services. Despite this commitment, implementation progress had halted, and funding is reportedly no longer available. Instead, a handful of one-off outpatient clinics had been substituted, supplemented by telehealth services.
