Bridport Pharmacy - Influenza

Influenza is a common viral infection that affects people of all ages. While it may be a mild disease for some, it can also cause serious illness and even lead to hospitalisation in otherwise healthy people.



Vaccination, administered annually by a health professional is the safest means of protection from influenza. Common side effects from the vaccine include mild pain, redness or swelling where the vaccine was given. These side effects usually last for a few days and go away without any treatment.

Babies and children younger than 5 years have a higher risk of complications from influenza potentially leading to hospitalisation. Even healthy children can get very sick from influenza.

Influenza vaccination is especially important for some If you are not eligible for a free vaccine, you can buy the vaccine. Talk to your health professional to find out how much it will cost.

Vaccination is very important for people aged 65 years and over as they are at high risk of getting sick from influenza.

All adults aged 65 and over are eligible for a free influenza vaccine that is specifically made to boost the immune response for better protection.

You should get vaccinated each year from April onwards to be protected before the influenza season. The peak influenza season is usually June to September in most parts of Australia. However, it is never too late to get the vaccine as influenza can spread all year round.

If you had last season's flu vaccine late last year or early this year, you should still get the new season vaccine this year when it becomes available.

Weeds by Lou Brooker

Last week, Dorset Council adopted the new Weed Management Plan for 2025 – 2030. It is a compilation of existing knowledge, a review of current practices and ultimately aims to eradicate priority 1 and 2 weeds from the municipality.

Declared weeds have a special legal status that requires landowners and managers to eradicate and control them. Some of the declared weeds that still persist in isolated places in the municipality include boneseed, pampas grass, foxglove, Spanish heath and ragwort. Stakeholders such as Forestry Tasmania, Parks and Wildlife, Biosecurity Tasmania, and TasNetworks already prioritize these declared weeds.

Many locals are involved in weed eradication on a voluntary basis: farmers are constantly active in weed management, walkers pull boneseed when it's in flower, CoastCare holds working bees focused on weeds in the Granite Point Conservation Area. Once the North East Field Nats joined Landcare, they took on a couple of major weed projects – one in North East Park and one in the Trent Water.

At the November meeting of the Dorset Coastal Working Group, draft copies of the new plan were issued and an informal discussion was invited. Subsequently an informal round-table was held between Council officers and interested DCWG members.

This discussion was a very welcome change from how policy had been decided previously. Congratulations to the Council for setting a new precedent where it listens to members of the community who have lived experience and thoughtful opinions. It makes us feel valued.

Some national parks and reserves maintain Fuel Stove Only Areas throughout the year.





From the Early Days to the 80's

Bridport Football Club will be hoping for another good season after playing finals last year and hosting their first ever home final.

The club first started in 1967, and their home ground was the Village Green in those days. Early guernseys were a lighter blue with a white collar and cuffs and a seagull emblem on the breast. Their first premiership came in 1973 when they defeated Branxholm.

The club's first premiership coach was Doug Partridge. The seagulls had some good players in the late 70's and early 80's, one of those was Brian Hill who passed away recently. Brian was a former coach of the club as well as a life member, and three time winner of the N.E.F.U. best and fairest. Older supporters would remember him as a very good player.

Chris Lovegrove coached the Seagulls to another flag in 1982, and other coaches in the 1980's were Oscar Styles, Tim Gillespie and Barry Jarvis.

Nowadays, the club has top of the range facilities, and coach Andrew Philpott will no doubt be looking for big things from his players this year.

A Stately Tree by Mike Douglas

Bridport has a scattering of Norfolk Island pines including a row of ten trees on the golf course.

Strictly speaking they are not pines but conifers belonging to the Auracaria family—a name derived from an indigenous people in Chile.

Norfolk Island pines, botanical name *Auracaria heterophylla*, are tall trees noted for their symmetrical form and are endemic to Norfolk Island.

Close relatives found around the South Pacific rim are the hoop pines and bunya pines in Queensland, monkey puzzle pines in Chile and the Cook pines in New Caledonia.

Norfolk Island, 1700 kilometres northeast of Sydney, was colonised in 1788 on the orders of Captain Arthur Phillip at Port Jackson—partly because of an unfulfilled expectation that the pines would provide spars for British ships.

The sloop *Norfolk* in which Bass and Flinders circumnavigated Van Diemen's Land 227 years ago was built using this timber. The boat leaked like a sieve because the planks were overly flexible, opening the seams.

This tree can attain a height of 50 metres so don't plant one in a garden as some unsuspecting people did in the past.

Imagine if Romeo and Juliet had lived. Imagine they have grown old together but now face being parted all over again.


