Bridport water solution down the drain?



Since January, Bridport Innovations has been trying to get clarification on whether a proposed longer-term water surety solution for Bridport has been dumped (again). Many residents will recall summer water restrictions being a regular occurrence in Bridport, and there is little capacity for growth.

To resolve this, Taswater's top 25 capital expenditure projects for 2022-2026 included an allocation of \$27.5m, of which \$20m was to be spent in 2024/25. That financial year has now passed, yet there is no evidence of water surety for Bridport being delivered. Despite our frequent inquiries, no explanation has been forthcoming.

Concerningly, this is not the first time a longer-term water solution for Bridport has been dumped. The previous capital works budget listed a Scottsdale-Bridport pipeline for completion by Sept 2022. It's now noted as "deferred."


Dorset mayor at the time, Greg Howard, said:

"Dorset Council are clearly unhappy that the upgrade of the Bridport Water supply has in fact been removed from from Taswater's future plans. We will, of course, continue to pursue this matter at the highest level."

Frustratingly, the need for such a solution was recognised as far back as Nov 2007 when Dorset Council (the then water authority) commissioned and costed a comprehensive solution.

Bridport Innovations believes that after 18 years in the too hard basket, water surety for Bridport needs urgent action for the future sustainability of our lovely village. We have had Taswater representatives attend three meetings here in Bridport and have invited them again.







- This helps you and your neighbours to breathe easier.



The Semaphore Crab by Lou Brooker



What do you call a crab who is afraid of small spaces? Claw-strophobic!

People are pretty familiar with soldier crabs - they love it in the soft sand of the estuary - I reckon they must end up pretty close to each other under the sand.

But there's another crab that lives on the other side of the saltmarsh where it's more muddy that has a more-or-less permanent burrow, which it runs to pretty quickly when people approach.

It's the semaphore crab. It has this weird habit of standing on the edge of its burrow and waving its claw. The waving looks a lot like semaphore signalling. Nobody knows why it's waving. It could be to defend its burrow by warning other crabs away. It could be to attract a mate.

When this crab is young its claw could be orange, but as it gets older, it turns purple, the colour of its dark mottled shell. It eats dead bits of plants and animals and when it's feeding, it uses one claw after the other. So, while one claw brings food to its mouth, the other claw collects more food, making it look greedy.

In an attempt to estimate how many semaphore crabs there might be in that section of the saltmarsh, I counted the crab

holes in one square metre [40] and came up with a figure of 40,000 crab burrows.

I reckon that's a good reason to feel claustrophobic!!

A Spectacular Mushroom by Mike Douglas

Recently, I was startled to see a of patch of Fly agarics (pictured) growing alongside the footpath in Richard Street, Bridport.

An introduced fungus, the fly agaric, Amanita muscaria, is a close relative of the deathcap even though it looks different.



This mushroom is unmistakeable, having large scarlet caps dotted with white or yellow warts and is often seen in pine forests.

The fly agaric contains a toxic alkaloid, muscadine. Medieval housewives placed pieces of the flesh in saucers of milk to poison flies and it was the active ingredient in sticky fly strips (remember them?)

The deathcap, a smaller pale green mushroom, contains the much deadlier chemical, amatoxim.

The death cap mushroom is the fruiting body of the fungus Amanita phalloides. This introduced European fungus occurs mainly around Melbourne and Canberra, although in 2017 a specimen was found in City Park, Launceston.

Murder by deathcap is nothing new. In 54 AD the Roman Emperor Claudius was poisoned by his fourth wife, Agrippina, who served him a dish laced with deathcaps.

Keep an eye out: Wild Mushrooms can poison your dog

Mushroom poisoning in dogs occurs when a canine ingests toxic mushroom(s). The severity of the poisoning will depend on the type of mushroom consumed and the amount of mushroom eaten.

The most toxic mushrooms cause the destruction of cells, especially liver and kidney cells, others affect the nervous system or cause gastrointestinal irritation. The following are some of the more common symptoms associated with mushroom poisoning:

Vomiting, diarrhea, excessive drooling, weakness, twitching, lethargy, uncoordinated movements, yellowing of the skin (jaundice), abdominal pain, seizures, coma.

My dog experienced a life threatening emergency from ingesting only a small amount of mushroom. Please be vigilant.

Mushroom poisoning is an emergency that requires immediate veterinary attention.




