In his retirement his late wife Pam bought him a lathe for a significant birthday around 1984 and a career in wood turning began.


He began turning and doing displays and exhibitions - firstly in Stanley in 1988, then North East Arts and Crafts, Kings Meadows High School, expanding to Deloraine Craft Fair and Agfest doing a dozen shows a year, attaining Best Display in 2000 at the Deloraine Fair. Eventually his individual pieces - eschewing mass production - were selling on the Spirit of

Tasmania and in most airport gift shops on the Eastern seaboard and Hobart.

Tom's favoured timbers - Sassafras, Leatherwood, Blackwood, CeleryTop Pine and Myrtle are now hard to find and costly to buy, while Huon Pine is still able to be sourced.

The Pavilion Visitor Information Centre has stocked his beautiful woodwork for many years, and due to his generosity we were able to keep our retail prices low and he was one of our biggest sales items. Buyers loved that each item was different, be it a lidded bowl, plates of all sizes and a variety of useful and quirky items. We miss you Tom!

These days, health has prevented him from the turning life, together with losing his 'business partner' Pam, Tom keeps up with his large garden and chooks, and is often seen riding his electric bike around the village.

#### **Swanning about by Lou Brooker**



I went for a drive on the internal road between Barnbougle and Lost Farm where the road follows a shallow waterway. I know it as a favourite nesting place for black swan.

I could not believe my eyes when I looked across the paddock, the swans were as thick as the hairs on a dog's back. No that's not a very good simile, but there were so many swans there, it seemed they outnumbered the cows. Is this a 'bevy of swans'? It's a term I've heard before. The conditions are certainly suitable for breeding here; there's plenty of feed, they can be close to the water and alongside the ditches, there are rushes in which to nest and lay their eggs.

Two swans cruised along the ditch beside the car. I stopped and wound the windows down to listen in on their conversation. It consisted of a short reassuring, crooning sound. Somewhat



like a peep or a squeak; occasionally I'd hear a little whistle.

Once, I heard the amazing bugling, trumpeting sound the black swan sometimes makes, a sound that carries far, but seemed to come from two swans swimming side by side just fifty meters away. I wondered why the different sounds and what that bugling meant.

On the way to Hobart, it's worthwhile stopping at Lake Dulverton in Oatlands where the swans spend ages building mounds on small islands. Or do they make their mounds look like small islands?

They don't seem to do this at Barnbougle. Here, their nests are more simple – a collection of grasses, reeds and other aquatic material.

Swans are monogamous for life, and it got me wondering if they also nest in the same spot each year, just restoring last year's nest. The one I saw close to the road last year used the same spot again

this year.

#### **Bridport Bandicoots by Mike Douglas**

**ALWAYS FREE** 

Conical holes in your lawn indicate the presence of the brown bandicoot, an attractive native marsupial, usually nocturnal, that superficially resembles an overgrown rat, although the rat has a longer tail.

They are fairly common in Bridport gardens, especially those where an area of lawn is fringed with dense, low shrubbery providing a hiding place.

A particularly good plant for a bandicoot refuge is the common sagg which grows vigorously in a garden situation.



Bandicoots are great diggers with lawn grubs that feed on the roots of turf sought after as a favourite food - so they are actually beneficial for your lawn. Golfers might have a different view after finding holes drilled in a putting green.

In bushland these animals turn over lots of soil during their search for insects and their larvae, worms and tubers. They are sometimes referred to as 'ecosystem engineers' since their foraging cycles nutrients and allows water and oxygen into the soil, helping to break down organic matter.

Tasmania also has the eastern barred bandicoot but it is uncommon around Bridport.





#### **Bridport and the 1890 Economic Depression**

Bridport and the 1890 Economic Depression Tasmania experienced severe economic hardship in the 1890s, marked by widespread unemployment, the collapse of the Van Diemen's Land Bank, and falling land values, all stemming from a downturn in world mineral prices, and a broader Australian recession. However, whilst a boom in silver and copper mining on the West Coast provided some relief, the Northeast continued to be severely impacted by depressed global mineral prices. The economic situation improved by the late 1890s, however the reliance upon mining in the North East of Tasmania was still affected by a drift of people to the mainland.

Whilst Bridport was not the main focus of the 1890s economic depression, which was a national and Tasmanian crisis, the completion of the Launceston to Scottsdale railway in August 1889 made sea trade via Bridport less viable, particularly as Bridport relied upon the prosperity that tin-carting brought to the town. As a direct result, local cargo ship captains, and their crews, were forced to find other employment, contributing to a population decline in the district.

Indeed, valuation rolls for the late 1890s and early 1900s reveal that many of the houses in Bridport were vacant, with some being resumed by the bank as a result of mortgage default.

Commercial activity fell to historical lows, with former mineral, timber and farm produce exports being diverted to the railway through Scottsdale. Where Craske's Jetty often saw queues of horse drawn carts containing farm produce and bags of tin, these fell away and only local farm produce was brought to Bridport for export by sea.

The critical transition from vital sea trade port to a seaside resort forced many that remained in Bridport to adjust their business and employment practices. The critical challenge to the migration to seaside resort was consistent with the economic depression delivering less disposable income for people to take holidays there. Fortunately, Bridport had begun this transition in the 1880s, thus Bridport had established itself as a tourist destination for seaside and fishing/hunting pursuits.

Despite all of this, the opening of the railway did not spell total doom for Bridport's sea trade, as surrounding agricultural enterprises continued to prosper, and wool was intermittently shipped from the port. Additionally, in 1900, Bridport was listed in the Encyclopaedia of Tasmania as becoming a favourite summer resort, there being good shooting, boating and bathing, both in salt and fresh water. The Daily Telegraph reported in 1909 that Bridport has become the seaside resort of pleasure-seekers from Scottsdale and adjoining districts, and even extending to influence from Launceston.

It must not be thought that Bridport became less important than it was prior to the 1890s depression, but as a seaside resort, Bridport improved annually in the estimation of the many visitors from far and wide. Bridport's recovery from the nation's economic depression was achieved through the change in focus to seaside holiday trade, aided by the construction of new hotels and accommodations for holiday makers, where Bridport went from strength to strength over the next few decades.


