**A Bridport Rockhop by Mike Douglas**

An entertaining way to stretch your legs is provided by the Granite Point rock scramble where reasonably nimble walkers and joggers can traverse granitic shelves, clamber over rocky obstacles and complete a circuit via roads and tracks.

Starting at the Old Pier, go to Mermaids Pool either via Murphys Beach or along the road to the pool access track, then follow your notes around the rocks to the eastern end of Adams Beach.

For the return leg, take the track to the Granite Point carpark followed by the road and Roly's Track which turns off the road 10 minutes from the carpark.

Taking your time might use up to two hours whereas greyhound types could zoom around in half that period.

Interesting geological and erosional features will divert some trippers along with rock pools, lichens and the coastal flora.

At 'The Boulders', 10 minutes around from Mermaids Pool, a boulder climber could chance their arm. The rock is granodiorite.

The Pavilion Information Centre can provide a map showing the route and other walks around Bridport.

## iNaturalist, an online social network of people sharing information about nature by Lou Brooker

Among the first explorers coming to Australia there were naturalists -for example, Joseph Banks was on Cook's voyage – and as they realized how different all the plants were to what they had known in England, they collected specimens and made detailed sketches and sent these back to England. There, they were kept at Kew, in London. Many of these are now also preserved in the Australian National Herbarium. There are presently 1.5million specimens there.

Around 312,000 of the earliest specimens collected in Tasmania, are housed in our own herbariums, one at UTAS and the other at QVMAG, all pressed and dried and with details of who collected the specimen and where and when it was collected providing a wealth of information for researchers. It's still possible to have a plant identified by staff at the Herbarium, but nowadays, there's also a much more accessible collection. It's contained in the amazing on-line database called iNaturalist.

Here's how it works..... download the app – create an account with a login and click and drag either pictures from your phone or from your computer. To make things easy, the pictures need to be fairly sharp, and reasonably close up. iNaturalist uses geo-data from your phone as well as date and time or you can add that yourself. Then simply upload. iNaturalist is monitored by specialists who then verify or correct the suggested identification. iNaturalist connects observers with specialists in various fields and leads to almost instant identification. My suggestion is use the [getting started](#) page, and have a go.

iNaturalist configures the data in many different ways. Below is a map of Trent Water indicating where, when and from whom observations were posted. Only some of them are mine.

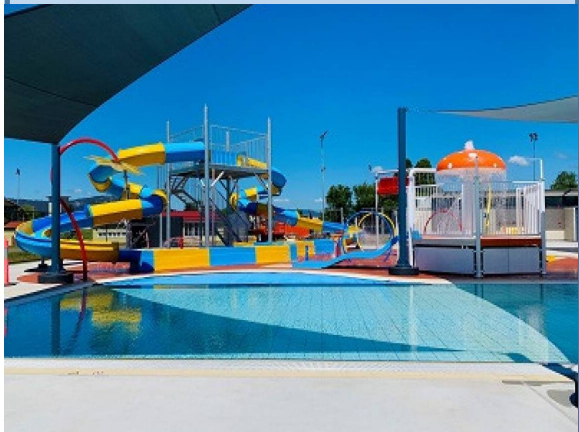



### How to Treat Tinea Pedis (Athlete's Foot)

With summer upon us, the warmth is causing an increase in fungal infections. Tinea pedis, commonly known as athlete's foot, is a common fungal infection that affects the skin on the feet—particularly between the toes and on the soles. It often appears as red, itchy, and peeling skin, sometimes accompanied by cracking or a burning sensation. The infection thrives in warm, damp environments such as sweaty shoes, public changing rooms, and around swimming pools.

### Treatment Options

Most cases can be treated effectively using antifungal creams, sprays, or powders. Products containing terbinafine, clotrimazole, or miconazole are particularly effective. These treatments should be applied to clean, dry feet, following the instructions carefully. Continue treatment for at least a week or two after symptoms have cleared to ensure the fungus is completely eliminated.

For more persistent infections, an oral antifungal medicine may be required—your pharmacist or GP can advise on this.

### Self-Care Tips

To help recovery and prevent reinfection:

- Wash your feet daily and dry thoroughly, especially between the toes.
- Wear clean, cotton socks and change them daily.
- Choose breathable footwear and alternate shoes to let them dry.
- Avoid walking barefoot in communal areas such as changing rooms or poolside.
- Disinfect shoes, socks, and floors to reduce fungal spores.

If symptoms don't improve after a couple of weeks of self-treatment, or if the infection spreads to your nails or hands, seek advice from your pharmacist or GP.

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## Bridport Earthquakes

Did the earth move for you recently? Northeast Tasmania, while generally less seismically active than the West Coast, does experience earthquakes, which are monitored by the national Geoscience Australia network, and historically by the University of Tasmania. The most recent activity includes small tremors near Bridport in late 2025, where Northeast Tasmania's Seismic Monitoring Stations reported that Bridport felt two earthquakes, the first was a 3.1 magnitude tremor on Sunday at 3.57 pm, 30 November 2025, and the second at 2.5 magnitude, was felt at 7.56 pm on Tuesday, 2 December 2025. Despite the shaky start to that week, this is by no means the first, nor indeed is it rare for the district.



Historically, Bridport experienced a large seismic event in the 1880s called an Earthquake Swarm, whose epicentre was offshore in Bass Strait, between Bridport and Flinders Island. An Earthquake Swarm is a cluster of tremors of similar magnitude in a small area that are not connected with a major earthquake. This event highlighted the need for ongoing seismic monitoring to understand risks from faults like the area in Bass Strait between Bridport and Flinders Island.

Early Recordings of seismology in Tasmania date back to the 1880s, with early instruments noting significant activity in the north-east, and particularly around Bridport. Kevin McCue, of the Australian Seismological Centre in Canberra, has completed detailed research on various earthquakes and tremors in the Northeast Tasmania, with specific mention of the region in and around Bridport.

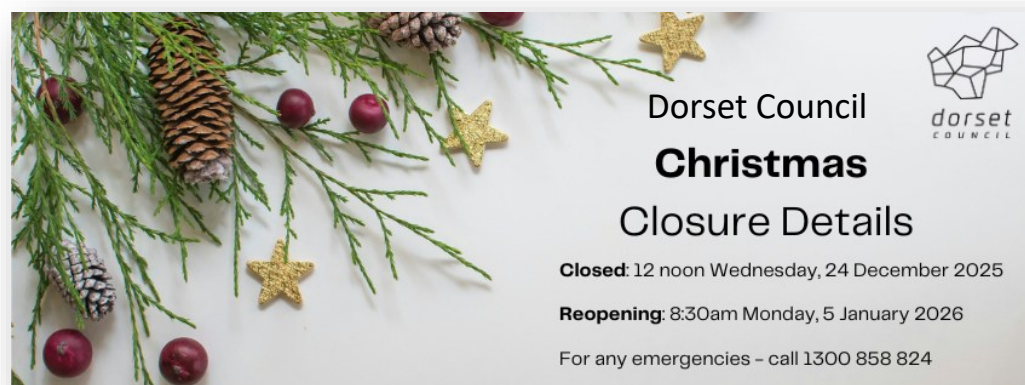
McCue's report into seismic activity in the area between 1827 and 1954, well before the first modern seismographs began operation in Tasmania, identified three particular earthquakes of about six in magnitude, two in the large swarm of tremors in the period 1883-1892, and one in 1907.

Tasmanian newspapers of the late 19th century report considerable earthquake activity at Bridport. Indeed, one report from the Mercury on 4 June 1883 had the headline: "Startling Shock of Earthquake at Bridport". The report observed that Mr Craske and some seamen were working at the wharf, and were quite alarmed. At the Telegraph office, the shock of earthquake was so severe that the lady operator, Miss L. Robinson, rushed to the window thinking the telegraph posts opposite had fallen. Mr. Glenny, of the National Mutual office, who was sending a wire at the time, said it was as if a large coach had rushed past the window. Dr. Vines and Mr. Jones, of the Forest Inn, were chatting when the floor seemed to shake under them, and the glasses and windows rattled.

Another earthquake was felt by Bridport residents at 1:25 pm on Thursday 12 August 1883. One resident was concerned that these earthquakes were becoming so frequent that they hardly pay attention anymore. Indeed, he was heard to say, "If they want to rouse us, why don't they send a proper earthquake!" Another earthquake was felt at Bridport at 8:30 am on Wednesday 10 September 1883. A Bridport correspondent reported that two further "distinct earthquake shocks" were felt, stating that the noise was very distinct, with a rumbling noise, like distant thunder. Again, on 9 March 1884, a further report indicated that Bridport was feeling more shocks of earthquake, with some very severe, but not of long duration. Many newspaper reports of this time indicate that there is considerable concern amongst residents over the frequency of the earthquakes. Again, in May 1884, a Bridport correspondent wrote: "A very severe earth tremor was felt here this morning, which lasted over two minutes. It was accompanied by loud rumbling. The most severe ever felt; no damage done, but people very much frightened."

The University of Tasmania started modern monitoring in the 1960s, establishing networks to study local seismic activity. Geoscience Australia has installed more advanced seismographs, and is analysing data, covering areas like the north-east coast, and is focused particularly in the area between Bridport and Flinders Island.
